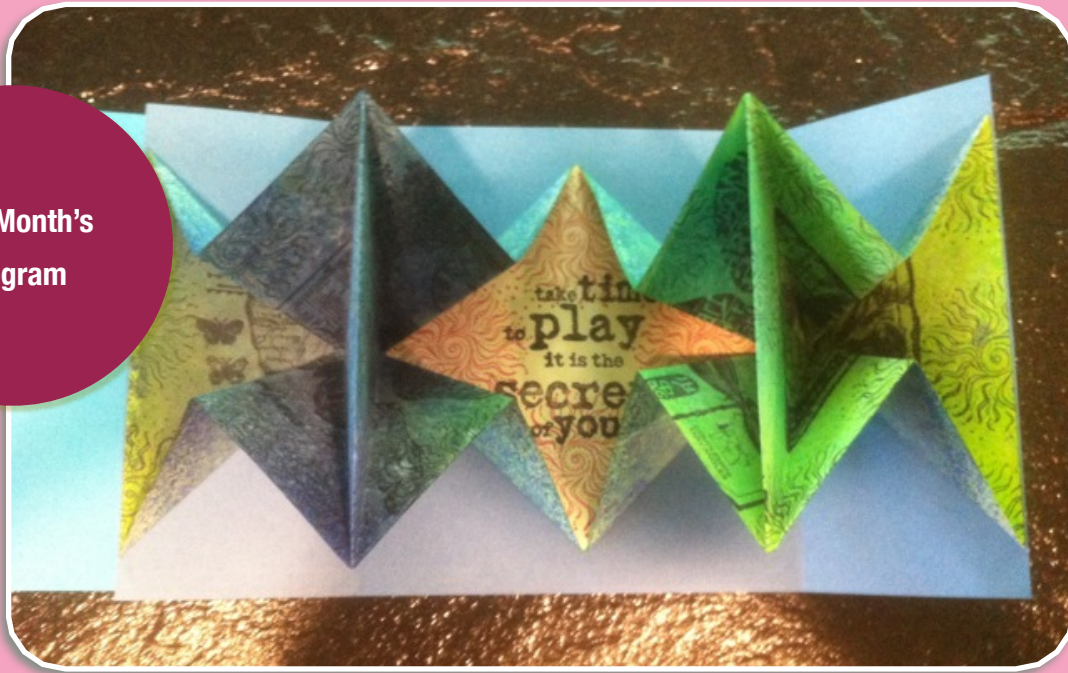

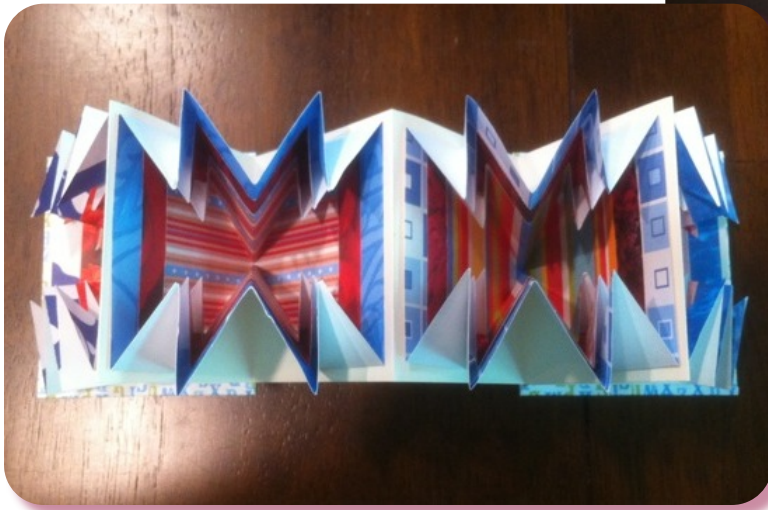
# August Program

# Harvey's Helpful Hints

Welcome back to the 2013-2014 Calligraphic New Year. Hope all had a good summer and have a lot of new ideas and challenges to work with this year. Dust off your pens and work areas to learn new hands and get involved with your Guild!

## Roll Away Tools

Tired of your tools rolling off your work area – sure, it's a nuisance so

here's a quick remedy: cut a square 1-1/2" of heavy cardstock or mat board, punch a hole in the center the size of the tool you want to secure, insert the tool in the hole and you have a non-rolling tool handy.

## Quotes

## Write it Down!

## More Envelopes

Not to be overlooked – when addressing envelopes always ask for a few more envelopes (10% is not an unusual figure) for mistakes, and the bride will surely have to add more names and address changes.

## Creativity

Most of us like a cup of coffee as a "pick me up", but the more you drink the less creativity you wind up with!

## Reviving Glue

You can reconstitute glue sticks that have dried up by soaking them in water for about an hour.

## Opening Jars

You will be floored looking at so many beautiful creations – Copperplate scripts, Signature Writing, Business Writing, Spencerian scripts, as well as various Blackletter hands of the day. There also is an example of the Zanerian Manual and I.A.M.P.E.T.H. Scrapbook included. This is definitely a "must have" item for reference! These photos will "blow your socks off"! And I finally can offer "Harvey's Helpful Hints" on CD after several requests instead of booklet form!*

# May Program Review

## “Carrie-Oka” Lettering with Tom Burns

Tom Burns presented the program for May with a demonstration of a hand he learned at Conference recently in Portland called “Carrie-Oka” which was developed by Carrie Imai. This hand is based on Neuland but has a unique and distinctive contemporary flair and the lettered words become a piece of art in themselves derived from the thickness of the strokes and the style of the letters. He showed us two variations of the hand – the original and a stylized variation of the original.

Tom began by explaining to us about how to prepare the pen for work.

He started by gently massaging the nib with toothpaste to remove any coating on the automatic or coil pen with a



paper towel. He then folded the towel in order to wipe inside the pen to remove the toothpaste and added a few drops of gum arabic to wipe off the nib. Tom concluded by drawing it slowly across a smooth piece of leather.

Next he demonstrated how to correctly hold the pen between the thumb and third finger in order to manipulate it easily and rotate it to make the curved thick strokes with the full nib width and pulling off the thin strokes with the corner of the nib. Tom stressed the importance of being relaxed and not “white knuckling” the pen by gripping it too tightly.

He suggested thinking of it as holding an egg or letting the pen “float on top of the ink.”

Since the letters in this hand are heavy and thick, the “x” height consists of only 2 pen nib widths and the ascenders and descenders are one nib width each.

Tom concluded the program by lettering the names of 6 lucky members whose names were drawn for the door prizes. He used his colored background paper for 3 names and lettered with undiluted bleach which subtracted some of the color from the background and left the names in a beautiful and unexpected color. He finished the other 3 on white Bristol board with blue and violet Pelican ink.

# Ruling Pen Workshop

Our wonderful weekend began with a very detailed presentation by Michael Clark on Friday, June 14, 2013. Michael is a well accomplished graphic designer and calligrapher. He has had over 30 years of experience in the industry and his work has been seen from national greeting cards and name brand logos, from store products to store names. The weekend was conducted in a relaxed manner. The instruction began with the use of the ruling pen and the different manners of experimentation of the pen in order to achieve different effects.

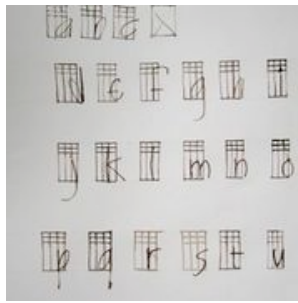
The very first assignment was to write certain words with either the ruling pen or the butterfly pen. The students were to write out the word to evoke the meaning of the word. There was a lot of playing around with the materials as well as looking at examples of work done with the ruling pen by Michael. The larger butterfly pen was even more fun. The different textures that can be achieved by the manipulation of the pen were quite surprising and each type of variation of the butterfly pen makes its own unique mark.

## Student Work



There were several assignments given out in class, and one of the favorites was to create an alphabet out of the strokes given by either of the two pens that were being used for the weekend. The one thing that was stressed over the entire weekend was that having fun and experimenting was the key to successful letters, strokes, and textures.

The last day of the workshop entailed making a butterfly pen. The instructions were easy to follow and the pen strokes were all magnificent, to say the least. One of the strokes made with the homemade pen was the circle or Enso, the Japanese word for the perfect and elusive circle which has been a source of admiration and awe through out the ages;



it means perfection, and never ending and continues to mystify the onlooker. Everyone in the workshop was able to produce other wonderful strokes with their own homemade pens.

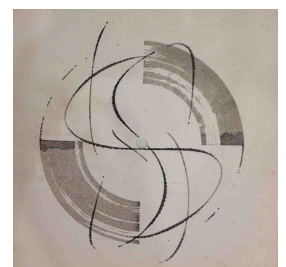
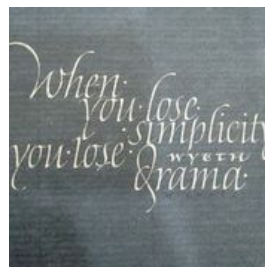

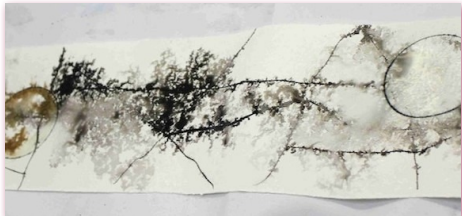

dry.



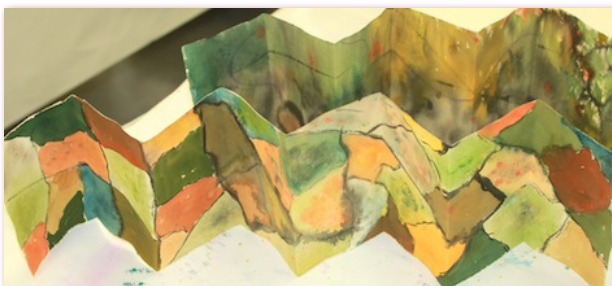
Then lay down the

in our own group. Just loved it! -June Baty



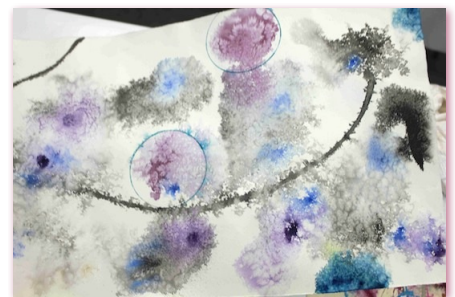

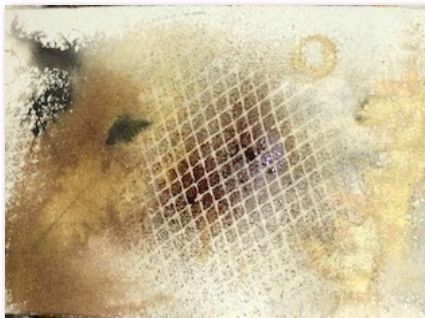
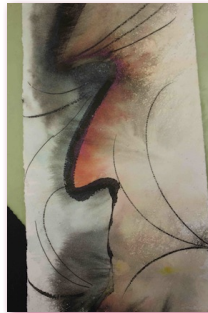
# Geo Paper Play Day continued...

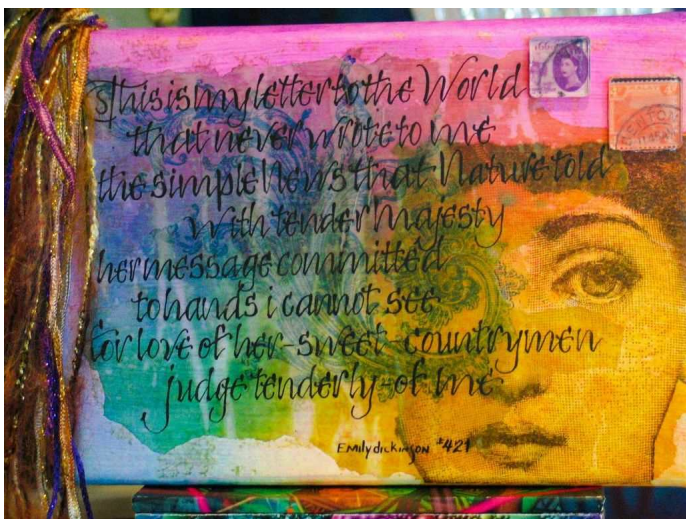

# Spotlight On... Thomas Burns



Hello - I'm Thomas Burns. My creative spirit was nurtured long ago as small child by my grandmother, but I had lost it or put it away due to the technical background I sought out in college. It remained hidden for quiet awhile, but it tried to break free from it's dark cold box I had put it in. It was freed by the one and only Donna Sabolovic. Neither of us knew the first night I showed up for her Copperplate class (it was the second week and she still accepted me and I came early to get caught up) what was to be unleashed and renewed within me.

It was that summer that Kaligrafos was having an exhibit from the year long Reggie workshop that had just finished. That opening night of the exhibit I joined Kaligrafos. I had never done calligraphy before the Copperplate class with Donna, and to see not only all the gorgeous writing, but beautiful art I knew I wanted more and was going in head first, no life vest! That was about 5 yrs ago.



The journey has been an incredible one. Have no fear and seize the opportunity to take every mini workshop, regular workshop, and be at every program. Thirst for knowledge and you will have more than your cup can hold with this spectacular group of people willing to share and help from their own experiences.

I've developed a love for pointed pen, but I must admit it was an acquired taste for me and one that I will forever continue to work at. I like Copperplate and Spencerian but the strictness of each discipline is incredible. I tend to

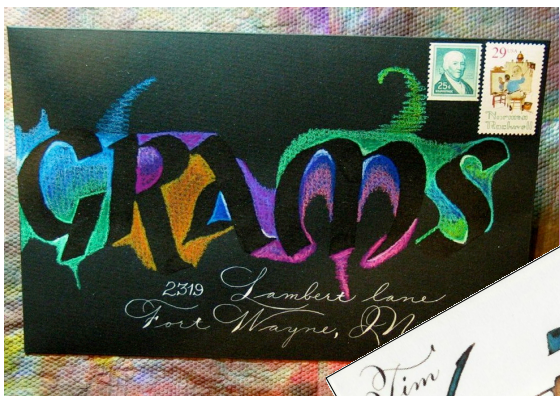
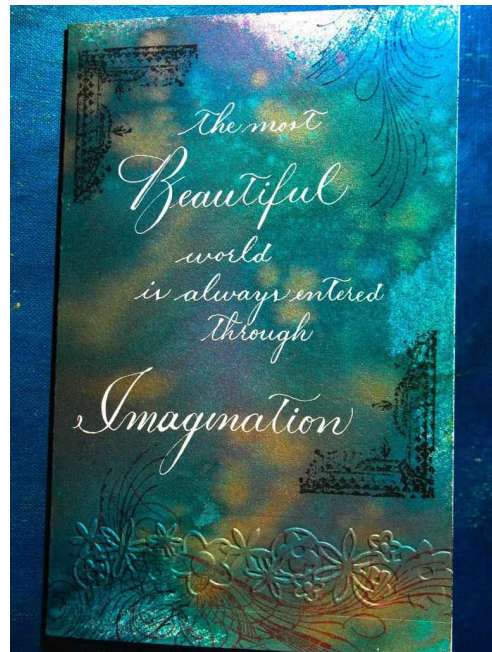
pull from both when I write the "pretty" hand. Pointed pen variations is a whole other world that I do play in and love it. I always have exemplars by my side when I write as I "play" with so many different styles. But, my passion is the ruling pen and I was in love the first time I saw it used.

I lean to Moon Palace (diluted) as it's easy and my go to. If I'm planning ahead I mix up gouache and water colors. Although for the ruling pen it's typically walnut all the way and then I drop in liquid acrylic ink for an eye catcher. My paper of choice is Arches Text wove and most recently Crane's Lettra.

Having never wanting to live in Dallas, it's been a great thing for me since arriving in late 2000. As I would not have found another passion which is Greyhound rescue. And of course BBQ'ing on the Big Green Egg! Although cooking in general is another vice....ok, I think I'll stop there. But, without my soulmate that came with me to Texas, Brenda, I might have never found Donna in the first place! That's a story for another time.....
