





# Laying Gold Leaf with Betty Barna

Betty Barna gave a wonderful demo and instruction on laying gold leaf. The best method is to reconstitute gesso on your own for the process, however this method is toxic as it contains lead. She learned this method in a class with Reggie Ezell.

Gold leaf is extremely fragile and the first step to working with it successfully is to turn off all fans and close windows or doors that could create a breeze as this will scatter your loose gold and make it impossible to use. Another valuable tip was to gather all tools you will need before beginning your process, although delicate, it is a fast moving process and there is no time to go search for a tool.

Recommended tools for this process (should



only be used for laying gold):

Suede pad

Knife\* to transfer and cut the gold leaf.

Scissors\*

Hematite burnisher or pure silk scrap for burnishing

Brush to remove excess gold


Straw or bamboo stick to rehydrate the medium

\*Both these items must be cleaned with acetone before use and may not be used with any other medium to avoid contamination.




Gold will reveal any other substance that may not be visible to the naked eye on your tools.

Depending on what type of effect you desire depends on what medium you will choose. Application using Instacoll will produce a



raised result and can also be applied over a sculpted medium. It sits on top of the paper and allows it to reflect light from many angles making it appear bright and shiny. Another method is the use of Ormoline, although lovely, produces a flat image and it not as shiny as the Instacoll. Ormoline soaks into the paper.

## Laying Gold Leaf Continued...




It's important to cover any pencil outlines with either medium as erasure will mar your final result.


Also the leaf is available in not only gold but

silver (not recommended due to tarnishing), platinum and aluminum. Not all leaf is real gold, composite gold can be purchased at craft stores in many colors and is less costly than true gold leaf. Gold leaf can be purchased in booklets of sheets, as patent gold leaf which comes on a tissue paper, is easier to handle and can be cut with scissors, or loose in a jar. All gold looks the same side by side, it's the medium used to apply that is most important and gives it color. Loose gold will generally be shinier over either medium.

When working with Instacoll, it will settle, do not shake it but instead use a tool like a wooden popsicle stick to gently mix. Because it is a raised medium, it's important to apply one coat. It is self-leveling but a second coat of the medium can result in a dimple which will show through in your gold. Texture of paper is not a factor for this medium as it will not affect the final result. Instacoll can eventually get very thick and go bad. If your



Instacoll has become thick, it can be thinned a bit with the use of distilled water. Apply the Instacoll with a paint brush (this paint brush must not be used for any other purpose), and let set for 30 minutes before adding the leaf.



Ormoline will produce a gold accent on your work but is flat against the page so it does not produce the shine you receive from Instacoll because it cannot give the same light reflection. Ormoline does not settle so no need to stir and do not shake. Georgia Angelopoulos uses this medium and recommends 2 coats. The texture of your paper will show through, so it's important to use super smooth paper. If you are outlining, use an 8H or 6H pencil, cover the pencil outline completely.



## Laying Gold Leaf Continued...



Do not erase, no amount of care in erasure will stop it from showing in your piece. Once you have applied the Ormoline with a paint brush, blow gently through a straw or bamboo tube to re-hydrate before adding the gold leaf. Use a brush to remove the excess gold leaf. Use a piece of pure silk to burnish the gold by wrapping it around your finger and rub to add shine.

To letter with gold leaf, use a liquid such as Mona Lisa Speedball liquid with a pointed pen to letter and lay the gold leaf over the top.

Use gloves. Betty gets photo handling gloves from B&H Photography. Other members mentioned these sources, Nicole Black uses Jet Pen for gloves and Marilee Haughey uses Tommy Copper gloves available at a variety of locations.


When creating a piece with gold, it is recommended to do the gold last, however it can be done vice versa. It's important to cover the portion you did first. The gold can and will cling to other parts of your piece, particularly if you are

writing with gouache because it is sticky. It is best to frame a gold gilded piece with a mat to lift the glass/plexiglass off the gold surface.

Glassine found as windows on envelopes or the envelope stamps come in from the post office can be laid over the gold to emboss the gold with hematite after application


Methylcellulose is a good sealer for variegated gold but not recommended for gold.

# Harvey's Helpful Hints

**Our spotlight on vintage nibs is shining on the Blanzy-Conte-Gilbert :** (Montgolfier Air Balloon) nib. This nib is bronze with a large air hole and medium flexibility. Its number is #172F and has the name of sergeant-major. That's a lot to remember for a nib, but "air balloon" will get you the right nib. Personally, I think it is more flexible than medium, but everyone has his/her own classification of flexibility. Try them out by coming over to my table at the meeting and try to prove me wrong – it's a super good nib to write with and one you will enjoy for a long time..

**Use Sandarac for paper on which the ink sinks in**, spreads or bleeds. Use Pounce on paper where the ink sits on top of the paper or when the paper needs more "tooth".

**Did you know that watercolor reproduces better than gouache?**

**When practicing large-sized lettering:** turn the newspaper classified ads sideways for instant guidelines. Believe it or not: it does work.

**A super good nib wipe is the paper coffee filter.** This not only cleans the nib, but will not leave any stray paper lint stuck to the nib. Try it – it works...but use a clean filter, not one that has been used.

**Ever hear of Tyvek?** Sure you have. This is a most usable paper product: the Postal department uses it for their envelopes, and is

great for book binding and origami. There are several different versions of Tyvek including a type for house building.

**Sometimes it's not easy reading the nib numbers stamped on nibs**, even with a magnifying glass. So as a solution insert the nib of choice into the penstaff of choice and label the handle of the penstaff. You can simplify life by doing this with all your currently used nibs and holders.

**After sharpening your nib use a piece of soft leather to finalize the nib sharpening process.** Just stroke the nib on the underside of the leather a few times to remove any stray burrs (both on top and bottom) left on the nib. It's surprising how smooth your nib will glide on the paper.

**Need a good quote, but can't think of one you really like?** On your Android device bring up the "QUOTE" application. On it you will find thousands under several categories. You won't go wrong with this application! And you can use it at no charge.

**Store your brushes upside down in a closed container**, and put in some moth ball flakes or moth balls in the bottom to keep the hungry critters away. They love to eat bristles!

**The Button Alphabet** was originally designed by Peter Thornton to use on name buttons, but was taken up by Louis Lemoine and has been taught by him, with Peter's permission, ever since. It is a fun funky alphabet that is pretty easy to learn and can be adjusted to each person's own style. I was able to take this class from Louis at the 2014 Legacies II conference here in Dallas.

Ruler (an Alvin parallel glider is handy but not critical)  
Marker Paper Pad (9x12") - it's translucent  
6 mm parallel pen (blue cap) with black ink  
Zig Cocoiro Letter pen black (from Paper & Ink Arts) or  
Sakura Pigma Micron 05 black pen  
Prismacolor French Grey 50%, pm159 for shading  
Good smooth paper for finished piece - like Arches Text Wove -  
not bigger than 1/4 sheet

## Optional:

Copic Wide Marker with black ink color (has straight, NOT angled tip) - also available from Paper & Ink Arts  
Colored pencils for coloring in spaces or colored markers for same purpose  
Walnut ink and automatic pens (#3A, #5) can be used too
