
DRAWING FOR CALLIGRAPHERS by KATHY SETINA Review by Lynda Kemple

Kathy's presentation in March was a quick course in drawing with the hope of incorporating drawing into our calligraphy pieces and also giving us a comparison between drawing and calligraphy.

She began by giving us a definition of drawing: in relation to visual arts, it implies making a mark, or pulling or dragging a tool across a receptive background, usually a piece of paper. Is that calligraphy? Is that drawing? Really, it could be both.

Drawing methods enrich the skills and processes that we use as calligraphers. We started with the basic elements of art, which are really the essential building blocks that govern any visual arts, including calligraphy and drawing. These seven elements are line, shape, form, space, value, texture and color, with line being the primary element used in both expressions of art forms.

There are many possibilities for comparing and contrasting drawing and calligraphy. Kathy did an amazing job of comparing and contrasting examples of famous artists' drawings with pieces of calligraphy. I found this portion of



the presentation fascinating as she pulled together works that demonstrated so well this concept. She showed several works of Rembrandt, Toulouse-Lautrec, Vincent Van Gogh and Degas. This was an exercise that helped us see the remarkable overlap in both calligraphy and drawing.


The next adventure Kathy took us on was learning how to really "see". This incorporated the left brain and right brain. She told us how the left brain is our dominant side and that it's part of the brain that we use to function. It is dominant, speedy, verbal and abstract. It rushes in with words and symbols to get us through our day. The right brain processes information in a fresh way. It is intuitive, subjective and non-verbal. We have to move from the left side to our right in order to really see and to draw what we see. Both calligraphy and drawing are considered right brain activities and promote meditation and stillness. Think about this!! Is it difficult for you to carry on a conversation while you are writing?

So how do we turn off the dominant side of our brain? You give it a job it hates to do and that's exactly what Kathy had us do! Our first exercise was upside down drawing, which would work well with learning a new hand. This exercise was both challenging and revealing. We saw lines and angles and shapes in an entirely different way. It was meant to slow us down and was very successful in promoting quiet in the room! Drawing on the right side of the brain is an internal dialogue. Don't we do that in calligraphy?

Next, we did a blind contour drawing. Kathy gave each of us a fresh cut flower. We put our pencils down on the paper and put our eyes on the edge of the object we were drawing.

With our eyes and hand was synchronized, we moved our eyes very slowly over the edge of the flower without looking down at the paper. What we were aiming for was one continuous line without lifting our pencil from the paper and our pencil to move at exactly the same speed as our eye. This was extremely slow. We were to capture every little curve or irregularity we saw as our eye moved along the lines and edges of the petal. No peeking! No erasing! The finished product was not the goal. Kathy said that contour drawings can produce some of the most sensitive drawings.

For the second time, the room became very quiet. Kathy said the basic idea was to get us to slow down and to really look at




the object and stop thinking in symbols; to become intimately familiar with the object we were drawing.

Studying things this closely should help our calligraphy. We can apply the same rules of observation in drawing to our forms.

One of the handouts we had was a value sheet.. The basic geometric forms (cube, cone, cylinder and sphere) are the underlying forms for almost everything. When beginning a drawing, simplify the subject. Look for the top and bottom and mid point of the object and get your proportions from there. Light and shadow are determined by the form of an object. Draw a little arrow to remind yourself where the source of light is. Shadows

falling on a rounded surface will have gradual changes in value. The way we can tell sharp angles is that there is a sharp contrast in lights and darks when the edge changes.

To show distance or space, there are three techniques. Firstly, overlapping shapes are used (putting one object in front of another). The lower on the page, the closer the object. Diminution is the reduction of size of something. One example is converging lines where parallel lines appear to converge at the horizon line. Aerial perspective, sometimes called atmospheric perspective, is the third method to indicate distance or space. As things move away from you, they get paler (ie: mountains), bluer and less detailed.



Our handout gave us examples of perspective. If you take a cup and hold it at eye level, the top line should be completely flat. If you move the cup above eye level, the front lip starts frowning. As you move the cup back down to eye level and then further down below eye level, the front lip begins to smile. This is an elliptical shape, not a fish shape and this information can be incorporated in drawing perspective for flowerpots, which many calligraphers draw.

Tom gave wonderful detailed instruction on the care and preparation of dip pens. Various methods of cleaning them were shared--flames, potatoes, toothpaste and rubbing alcohol. He also gave tips on using gouache--not a recipe, but using 'smidges' and 'pinches' of a little water or a little gouache, to get it just right. His handout, written in his inimitable style we've been enjoying in our newsletters, is a valuable resource for other writing tips as well. I definitely recommend this mini workshop if he offers it again.

The pursuit of honing her craft has led Risa to advanced and special-focus calligraphy studies at the Accademia Delle Arti Calligrafiche in Cittadella, Italy, St. John's University via a Schlossberg Scholarship, the Getty and Huntington Libraries, and the UCLA Center of Medieval and Renaissance Studies, the Marquis de Sentmenat School of Design in Barcelona, Spain, and Princeton University's Department of Spanish Medieval Art.



Visigothic Versals are an exclusive, distinct and independent lettering tradition unique to 7th - 11th century Spain. This is the magnificent artistic period under the rule and influence of Islam, when the Ottoman Empire of the East met the Holy Roman Empire of the West! The results were one of Spain's greatest treasure and the most important religious writing of the Middle Ages - the Beatus Manuscripts The manuscripts designs are in the Mozarabic art style, which unites early Arabic roots.

HARVEY'S HELPFUL HINTS

April 2017's spotlight is on the newly acquired Heintz & Blankorts, made in Germany. It is bronze, "bird beak" style with 3 air holes and slightly longer than normal, so you will be sure to use an "open ended" nib holder. It is quite flexible and sharp, giving you the desired swell stroke with a super fine upstroke...you will really like using this nib as it will do everything asked of it. Your lettering will definitely have the "professional" look, and your finished piece will reflect the beauty of the lettering done with this nib. Try it out at my table at the meeting.

If you have access to a Mac computer, you have access to a circle and spiral layout. Simply pull up the Application in the Finder and you will have it on the screen. You can print out the template you want and/or use your computer for a trial. They even give you a suggestion as to which nib to use. Try it – you might like it...beats the heck out of starting from scratch and no one will know you didn't start from scratch yourself...this is a real time saver.

This is for the embossing crowd, a good template weight is a manila folder...too heavy and you'll tear the paper, and too lightweight won't emboss deep enough. This is the Goldilocks weight – just right! Always be careful using the Exacto blade – they are super sharp and will take skin and fingers off in a heartbeat!

Definitions: Chirography: Handwriting or penmanship

Cacography: Poor writing or poor penmanship

Calligraphy: Beautiful writing

If your lettering looks a bit stiff, Susan Skarsgard uses (and recommends) using just a waist (mid) line when lettering. This might help you and your lettering loosen up a bit.

It's a good idea to make a copy of your finished work, a photo will suffice. Be sure to include all the pertinent information along with the photo, i.e. ink, nib, paper and size, and any critical measurements so that you will be able to reproduce it by hand when necessary. Brings to mind one of my clients used to come to me for duplication of a project I did for them a couple years before. Without the necessary information I would have been lost. I always kept the information in a client folder with name, date, name of the project, along with the necessary info, etc.

Sheila Waters suggests looking at the inside corner of the broad nib when lettering instead of the letter itself. This should help the look of the letters.



**ARTISTS:** Please submit up to two entries to the juried competition which incorporate your interpretation of the theme of the exhibit. Selected artists will be featured in the month long exhibition in Goodrich Gallery at First United

Methodist Church in the heart of the Arts District in downtown Dallas, and receive recognition on the church website. An Opening Reception honoring the artists will be held Sunday, October 1, 2017, 12:00 to 2:00 following the worship service. During the exhibition visitors will have an opportunity to cast ballots for the People's Choice Award. On Sunday, October 29, 2017, at 12:30, the top three winners will be announced, with a prize award going to the overall winner. At that time exhibitors may take any unsold art work with them.

To enter please submit your entry in the attached form by Midnight, Tuesday, August 1, 2017 for consideration of participating in the juried art exhibition. Please review the following requirements to be considered for the show. Acceptance letters will be sent via email on Monday, August 21, 2017.

- Please title your file like this: title, size, artist.jpg.
- Upload entry specifications: Maximum width 2500px wide at 72dpi/ 180dpi. Accepted artists will be featured through our online media.
- Submit a headshot in addition to your artwork for publicity purposes. Please include your name, medium and website url.
- All 2D work must be suitably framed and wired for hanging. Gallery wrapped canvas is also acceptable. Work should not exceed 48"x48".
- Art work must be original. Work done in a production studio, classes or workshops, work from kits, commercial designs, and derivative work is prohibited. All work must be new and not previously shown at the Goodrich Gallery.
- Work may be offered for sale or marked NFS on the entry form. The Gallery will retain 25% of any sales. Please take this into consideration when determining the sales price. Sales tax is the responsibility of the artist.
- Artists must include in the online registration a statement describing how the entry relates to the theme *First Fruits*.
- Acceptance letters will include important dates and an exhibition contract to be completed and returned via email or fax to Music & Arts office in First United Methodist Church. (Rejection notification emails will follow promptly.)
- Insurance of art work is the responsibility of the artist.
- Work must have index card with artist's name, title of work, price and contact information attached to the back of the work.
