








































































Round Robin weekend was a huge learning and sharing experience for the 16 participants, led by Jeri Wright, Betty Barna, Sherry Barber, Anita Hofmeister and Debi Semintelli. The weekend pace was fluid and transitioned smoothly.

Day One, we began our morning making beautiful colorful paste paper under the guidance of Jeri and Betty. We were provided many texturizing tools to work with and lots of ideas on how to use them effectively. Some participants brought additional paper to color paste for future projects.

While our papers dried, we stopped for lunch and went straight into the afternoon session with Anita teaching Blackletter techniques. Her teaching method and detailed handouts made the alphabet much easier to comprehend and learn. After some practice, we wrote a few short quotes as Anita travelled from one student to the next, helping with our individual problems. It was a successful art day, although the rains poured outside.

Day Two, brought sunshine as everyone arrived, eager for the next session led by Debi teaching brush lettering. Debi's handouts were detailed, and right away she began sharing shortcuts and ideas to help learn this hand. Yes, there is a way to master this even if you think you are too heavy-handed to get that thin upstroke. Debi also went about the room giving everyone one-on-one assistance and suggestions.

After a lunch break, Sherry was ready for us to assemble our books and begin the sewing process. We chose threads from a large color selection. Most found the sewing easy, but a few of us got tangled in the threads. Oh OK, it was just me.

There is an amazing number of skilled artists and talent within our membership. These five people went to a lot of work to provide us with professional handouts and teaching during this very creative weekend. This Round Robin weekend was money well spent.





The February Round Robin weekend was a great creative time spent with fellow Kaligrafos members both teaching and learning. Our own Jeri Wright and Betty Barna kicked off the morning with a Paste Paper project. We were encouraged to get in touch with "our inner child artist" as we laid down several colors of acrylic paint and glue with sponges onto text paper in an abstract format. It was a free form exercise that was fun and the beautiful results led to each of us having a booklet cover that we later bound with text pages of lettering styles we created from the weekend.

Anita Hofmeister led us in the creation and teaching of Blackletter . Using parallel pens, we began with exercises drawing lines and diamond shapes used to create the Blackletter alphabet. Anita demonstrated how this lettering style can be enhanced by dropping some colored ink into the wet walnut ink lettering. This is a style that can be impactful on envelopes and cards, well beyond traditional use on certificates. We were given handouts for practice later.

Debi Sementelli enthusiastically taught Modern brush lettering to our group. She gave us tips and techniques using a Pentel brush pen. Encouraging us to practice drawing shapes until manipulating the pen became so natural you don't even think about it, "similar to golfing".


We worked on shapes and putting pressure onto the brush to draw thick and thin lines. Later, we wrote words and quotes. She reminded us to breathe and have fun with this relaxed style of lettering. She passed out brush lettering style sheets with information on flourishing. This is a fun and popular style to practice and use in creating lettering onto cards, envelopes or canvas.

The final class was member Sherry Barber guiding us through a Japanese style of "Stab" binding. We each chose a binding thread to complement our paste paper book and sewed or "jabbed "a needle and thread through the pages inside the cover to create bound booklets (shown below). This was a great way to spend a winter weekend with Kaligrafos friends that love lettering, painting and creating!

HARVEY'S HELPFUL HINTS

This month's vintage nib spotlight is on the ESTERBROOK #126 DOUBLE SPRING nib with built-in reservoir. Yes, this nib can do it all – not quite as springy as some of the others, but will surpass them in a heartbeat! They are long lasting surpassing many of the others, especially on textured paper. Don't be afraid to try this fine nib – it will do anything you want it to do!

Try this one: Clean dried ink from your nibs by rubbing a #2 graphite pencil lead on the dried ink. The graphite polishes the metal and helps prevent rusting. This Hint might even save your nib from further damage...

Always practice on the best paper you can afford. And when purchasing paper if possible, purchase at least two or more sheets (in case of errors). A note on purchasing good practice paper: do as I say, not as I do. Reminds me of a time I was doodling with stippling of 15th century capital letters on a poor sheet of paper. Started out okay and liked what was happening, but then didn't quit on the poor sheet of paper. Still have the project, still looks okay, but if it had been done on a decent sheet of paper I would have matted and framed the piece to look even better.

If you line your papers in pencil, line more than one sheet – in case you err, you have a second sheet available, already lined, and you don't lose your rhythm.

A note on achieving rhythm, listen to soothing music while writing. After a short time, you won't even hear the music, but you will keep your rhythm. Your lettering will look much more relaxed and flowing. Make your transparent colored ink look better by adding Pro-White. This will reduce the transparency and will look great on dark papers. Of course use a few drops at a time to the ink to get the desired effect...

If you do not have a good paper cutter yet, and can afford one, by all means get one. They are not expensive, but you will find yourself using it more than you might think. I prefer the Fiskars rotary cutter as opposed to the Guillotine type cutter (for obvious reasons). The guillotine cutter will cut more sheets at a time, but there is too much chance of losing a finger even though they furnish a hand (finger) guard. And the more sheets you cut at a time will be too ragged and uneven to use.

Which leads me to opening stuck caps on Tubes and bottles. NEVER use a pair of pliers for this job – use a "nutcracker" instead. The jaws of the nutcracker are more parallel than the pliers and won't crack the plastic caps as easily. This doesn't sound like a big deal until you crack the lid on your ink bottle.

When using your own (or purchased paper), be sure to get the matching color and size of envelope if you want to use a matching envelope for the paper. This is most critical. It's a good idea to purchase the envelope first (if necessary) because there are more colors of paper than envelopes. If necessary you can cut parent sheets to fit the envelope. Be sure to buy the correct color and size of envelope and start from that point.
