# The Ruling Pen with Thomas Burns

#### November Program Review

Fab 5 Art Books & Rick Garlington's Stamp Carving By Autumn Swindoll

In November's program, the Fab 5 - Jeri Wright, Betty Barna, Sherry



Barber, Rick Garlington, and Thomas Burns presented their recently completed alphabet stamp books. They described the process and techniques involved in their collaborative project,

including the carving of the stamps in rubber, the layout design for the books, and the monumental 94-step process of binding the books with the Japanese star stitch.

Following the group presentation, Rick Garlington, aka "Rapscallion Rick", gave a demonstration focusing on the making and use of the carved stamps themselves. To create his stamps, Rick uses Speedball linocut tools to carve in Safety Cut rubber





(available from the online retailer, Nasco). "It's like slicing into butter with a warm knife," Tom Burns remarked of the process. Rick also showed us how he creates his own custom ink pad out of flannel paper by spraying it with ink pad refresher and dripping ink on it. At first, the "ink pad" looked like a sorry splatter of spilled inks, but when stamped, it yielded a stunning marbled color effect. Many "Ooo's" and "Aaah's" were heard when Rick lifted his stamp to reveal the beautiful finished product. (See the next page for stamp pictures.)

## Carving Your Own Stamps with Rick Garlington By Monica Winters

How does one write an article about a workshop conducted by Rick Garlington? Certainly it would best be done using a series of images or video accompanied with sound to capture the repartee, but then this writer would not have been able to participate in the workshop! Thus I write from meager notetaking which cannot adequately convey the pleasures of participating in this lively but intense workshop.

Each recipient received a packet with a replica of our name stamped colorfully on the outside. These Packets contained a beautiful handmade booklet of sample alphabets (another of Rick's creative skills worthy of its own workshop), a how-to stamp article, a piece of sticky-back foam, and a stamp pad. Rick began the workshop with a plethora of elaborate examples that he created, although he encouraged us to start simply after explaining the process.

The substance used for carving the stamps is called "Safety-Kut", available from NASCO. Basically it's a crumble-free piece of rubber eraser. While the Safety-Kut itself is inexpensive, the shipping costs more than the item itself because it is so heavy. Rick usually waits until it goes on special sale to keep his costs down, and then orders a bundle of it. He also gets his stamp pads on clearance or discontinued sales.

Most of us provided our own linocut carving tool, although Rick was prepared with plenty of extras for those who weren't able to acquire one. I think I got the last one at my local Michael's. Rick instructed that we start with blade #1, a simple design, and a piece of Safety-Kut.

We started the process by tracing a design onto tracing paper, keeping in mind that the design will print in reverse. Rick cut the larger pieces of Safety-Kut with an X-Acto knife to fit the approximate size of each of our images. He demonstrated the necessity of being sure to cut at an angle away from the image area to keep the base of the stamp sturdy.

Once we had our piece sized, we used a sanding block to smooth the surface of the block, starting with medium grit and finishing with fine grit. This ensure a smooth, deckle-free stamping surface.


We then transferred our image (traced onto tracing paper) upside down onto the Safety-Kut and rubbed to transfer the design onto the surface of the Safety-Kut. It transfers quite easily.











Now to begin the fun part: using #1 blade from our lino cutter blade set, we outlined the image, keeping *outside* the pencil line.

The trick is to hold your hand steady and twist the rubber Safety-Kut instead of holding it still and twisting your hand.

Next, we came in with a #2 or #3 blade to remove the background. One has the option to create texture in the background like a woodcut or to remove the background cleanly. Once we removed a sufficient amount of background space, we tested our stamps by dabbing the stamp pad all over the image and then pressing the stamp on practice paper. Rick encouraged the use of stamp pads for inking, rather than applying our calligraphy inks or watercolor or gouache. Stamp pads have special inks that are intense and somewhat slower at drying. Also, when you order a stamp pad, it is helpful to order the little bottle of refresher ink to restore your stamp pad.

After inspecting the test print image, we then used the #1 blade to clean up small ticks.

Rick encouraged us to make our own alphabet in our free time and share after our holiday break. Design possibilities are endless, as Rick provided us with many examples and resources from which to experiment. He worked with each participant individually to hone technical skills. The process is relatively simple, yet labor intensive. The end result, however, is that multiple images can be created from the stamp, and in that way stampmaking *saves* time (think: Christmas Cards, etc.) And each stamp that we can create will be uniquely our own. Thank you, Rick. That was fun!





Paper Making round number.... Umm, I've lost count



## Layering with Letters -Roann Mathias



Roann Mathias is a mixed media artist specializing in calligraphy. She designs greeting cards and calendars for Conception Abbey's Printery House. She teaches calligraphy and mixed media workshops throughout the US and Canada. Her work has been published in Somerset Studio Magazine, Letter Arts Review and exhibited nationally. She was recently chosen by *Chith Paper Scissors* magazine as 2012 Artisan of the Year in Art Journaling and Bookmaking.

For the past 30 years she has taken workshops from all the major calligraphers, and has taken Reggie Ezell's Yearlong class 4 times! She was on the faculty of Island Magic conference in 2007, and taught miniworkshops at the Chicago and Dallas conferences.





In this workshop, you will learn how to create multiple layers using text. This kind of layering creates interesting patterns, as well as a sense of depth in your art. Using gesso, acrylic paint and acrylic mediums on paper, we will paint on and scrape out letterforms. Neuland will be the primary style of lettering for this class, so there will be time spent reviewing that hand. We will also use italic, foundational and blackletter to add variety.

### 2019 Contest Theme: Put Your Stamp On It

This year's theme celebrates the 25th anniversary of the Graceful Envelope Contest and the 125th anniversary of US commemorative stamps. Your challenge is to create an envelope that commemorates anything of your choosing. To "Put Your Stamp On It," make sure your submission reflects the artistic hand lettering and imaginative use of color and design that have been the hallmarks of the contest. And, of course, incorporate postage stamp(s) into your creation.

You may enter only one envelope. Entries must be processed and delivered through the U.S. Postal Service as First Class Mail and may not be wrapped in a separate envelope or protective covering (unless multiple entries are coming from one class).

On the BACK of the envelope, print "FROM" and your name, address and email (or teacher's email). Students need to provide their grade, because judges will consider entries in these categories:

\* Adult

- \* Grades 9-12
- \* Grades 5-8 \* Grades 1-4

Deadline for entries: March 25, 2019
