I'm sorry to say I don't have any pictures of the lovely bounty of food that was brought in for the event.






There were a number of members there early who offered a hand getting things setup up. Things became so hectic, I didn't get all the names down but know that your assistance was truly appreciated.

# History is Interesting.....

There are a few of us in the guild who enjoy participating in the Pushing the Envelope Exchange run by Jean Wilson in Des Moines, Iowa. Jean has a blog and often shares pictures of envelopes she is working on or has been sent or pictures of her studio or pictures that have been sent to her. I asked if I could share this in our newsletter from her March 2<sup>nd</sup> Pushing the Envelope Exchange Blog (http://pushingtheenvelopes.blogspot.com/).

For the February Exchange, she asked that if we mailed our envelope before the 15<sup>a</sup> of the month to make the addressee Viola Anderson. Viola is her brother's mother-in-law and was transplanted from Louisiana to Iowa. Viola celebrated her 99<sup>a</sup> birthday in February.

It's always interesting to me to hear about the lives of people who have lived so long. Think of everything they have seen. Jean included in her blog the following information about Viola which I found fascinating. In addition there is a calligraphy/lettering tie in. There are a couple of interesting links at the bottom. I hope you enjoy the story.

"I wish I had a video of Viola telling us the story of her first job. She worked for the railroad in Louisiana. Job title: Train Order Operator. She said she was 22, so that must have been 1942. At the time, the railroads had only one track to be shared by trains going in both directions. There were sidings where trains had to pull off to let opposing trains pass. Clearly, running into each other would have been a mess.

So, there were people hired to pass a note to the engineer to let him know when it was his turn to pull off on a siding. The note was attached to a long pole and people like Viola had to go out and stand right next to the track and the engineer would stick his hand out the window and grab the note. The train would slow down - but it was still moving as the engineer grabbed the note. Viola said it was scary standing so close to a moving train.

Viola even worked the graveyard shift. She took a bus to her outpost, started at midnight, and worked until 8 am. Her supervisor suggested she take a gun since she'd be out there by herself in the middle of nowhere. Lucky for Viola, her mom had a gun she could borrow.

I'm not making this up.

At this point, Viola giggled and said there was no way she could have shot anyone. Eventually she became a station agent and I am looking forward to hearing more about that job.

# Layering with Letters -Roann Mathias



Roann Mathias is a mixed media artist specializing in calligraphy. She designs greeting cards and catendars for Conception Abbey's Printery House. She teaches calligraphy and mixed media workshops throughout the US and Canada. Her work has been published in Somerset Studio Magazine, Letter Arts Review and exhibited nationally. She was recently chosen by Cloth Paper Scissors magazine as 2012 Artisan of the Year in Art Journaling and Bookmaking.

For the past 30 years she has taken workshops from all the major calligraphers, and has taken Reggie Ezell's Yearlong class 4 times! She was on the faculty of Island Magic conference in 2007, and taught miniworkshops at the Chicago and Dallas conferences.





In this workshop, you will learn how to create multiple layers using text. This kind of layering creates interesting patterns, as well as a sense of depth in your art. Using gesso, acrylic paint and acrylic mediums on paper, we will paint on and scrape out letterforms. Neuland will be the primary style of lettering for this class, so there will be time spent reviewing that hand. We will also use italic, foundational and blackletter to add variety.

#### 2019 Contest Theme:

#### Put Your Stamp On It

This year's theme celebrates the 25th anniversary of the Graceful Envelope Contest and the 125th anniversary of US commemorative stamps.

Your challenge is to create an envelope that commemorates anything of your choosing. To "Put Your Stamp On It," make sure your submission reflects the artistic hand lettering and imaginative use of color and design that have been the hallmarks of the contest. And, of course, incorporate postage stamp(s) into your creation.

You may enter only one envelope. Entries must be processed and delivered through the U.S. Postal Service as First Class Mail and may not be wrapped in a separate envelope or protective covering (unless multiple entries are coming from one class).

On the BACK of the envelope, print "FROM" and your name, address and email (or teacher's email). Students need to provide their grade, because judges will consider entries in these categories:

- \* Adult
- \* Grades 9-12
- \* Grades 5-8
