






March 14th, 2020: Thomas Burns teaches his version of Weaver Writing.

A Review of What's New in the World of Ink?

To kick-off the new Kaligrafos year, we had an awesome presentation from Thomas Burns, Eric Doerr, and Rick Garlington discussing what's new in the world of ink. It was a delightful and informative presentation.

Rick started off with information about the increasingly popular Bister Inks, discovered in Europe by Amity Parks. She wrote an article for *Bound & Lettered Winter 2018* with some lovely work from this wonderful product. There's a link to her article on the *John Neal* website from the Bister Ink order page.

Bister Ink is made of Beechwood Soot and reacts much like walnut ink. It is shipped in a powder form with instructions for mixing. The powder dissolves best with warm water. It was noted that we could mix it with either distilled or tap water. When using tap water, if there is a concern about mold, add


two to three drops of isopropyl alcohol. *John Neal* recommends four parts water to one part ink.

Rick, in his rebel ways, mixes the powder as 16 parts water and one park ink. He provided a wonderful handout that demonstrates each color in the following dilution ratios: 1:16, 1:8, and 1:4. They produce wonderful, rich color and are delightful for writing. Bister is a dye-based ink and can be used as a spray. Mix a 1/2 dropper of the pre-mixed ink and

fill the remaining portion of the bottle with water. The ink also works like water color; if drops

are placed on a surface and dried, it can be reconstituted with a few drops of water. It worked great with watercolor paper and was great for use with the ruling pen. It the color we are using is a light enough value, you can use the ink as a drop-in color.









Eric Doerr was up next to talk about Chromatography

and using fountain pen ink for something other than lettering. He brought samples of 140 lb. water color paper and applied water with a large paint brush to the top two-thirds. While the paper was still wet he used a small paint brush to drop fountain pen ink into the water, creating some awesome looking designs. He told us



that if we don't get the desired result while wet, add a little more water. He tilted the paper in different directions to allow the ink to flow through the water to create a design. We will

need to perform this all in one step, because if we wet the paper later, after it has dried, we will not get the same effect.

Chromatography is a lab technique where an agent is used to separate the constituents. In this process, water is the constituent. Fountain pen ink is a dye-based ink. He advised that we get different color variations from different inks when dropping into the water. For example, Diamine Earl Grey produces colors of grey, pink and blue


when dropped into water. Noodler's Rome Burning can produce brown, burgundy, and purple. Parker Quink Black, found locally at stores like Staples, produces a green background. A sampler was provided with these inks as well.



One very valuable tip that Eric offered is to never dip your brush or dip pen directly into the fountain pen ink container. Doing so will contaminate your ink.




Next up was Tom to talk about sheen and shimmering inks. He presented the different properties of the two inks and how they appear differently when applied to paper. The differences are absorption, refraction, and drying time, evident when we view the dry ink. A handout was presented with a number of sheen and shimmer ink samples to make the comparison. Tom noted that he liked the Organics





Sheen is a property of the ink. The slower the absorption to the paper, the better the effect. Like oil on water, underneath there are bubbles, typically blue with red tones that the light or light angles bring out. Recommended types of paper are higloss or Rota, and Drawing 160 Artist Paper from the

Handbook Paper Company, available on Amazon. Do *not* water color paper.



Shimmer is an ink with glitter particles (like mica) added. The particles will settle into the bottom in the ink. On the handout, you can see the particles. This ink should never be left in a fountain pen because the particles can clog and ruin your pen.

Herbin Inks—1670 Anniversary and 1798 Collection have both sheen and shimmer inks.

You can use Akkerman ink with a dip pen by adding a little gum arabic. Do not add the gum arabic to the entire bottle or it becomes unusable for fountain pens. Put it into a separate, well-marked container or mark the container so you do not make this error. The gum arabic thickens the ink and it would clog your fountain pen.

A Review of

Paste Paper Workshop (Saturday) with Madeleine Durham



Madeleine Durham brought some artsy Santa Fe vibes with her when she left her home studio in the high desert to share her unique way of making paste paper with Kaligrafos in Dallas. The activities began on Friday evening at FUMC in Richardson with a slide show of Madeleine's work. Hearing her personal life journey illustrated that beautiful things can come from adversity. Yet, the story wasn't told as one of adversity, but was woven into the strands of her everyday life and of how her particular paste paper style was born. Afterward, being able to see and touch her beautiful papers as we shopped for both paper and jewelry was a treat. Each colorful piece brought forth different responses from those browsing nearby. So many of the papers were take-your-breath-away beautiful that you can see why the New York Metropolitan Museum of Art would have a place for her work in the paper archives...and why it would appear in an ad for Tiffany jewelry.












Tranquil is a word that has been used to describe Madeleine's work, but it is a word that also describes Madeleine herself. As a teacher, her presence was calm and quiet, yet masterful. Watching the extralarge filbert brush do its magic on the paper was mesmerizing. She masterfully mixed the colors and laid them down in ways that seemed magical. Imagine our delight when we put our own brushes to the paper and found out that we, too, could make colorful, striped paste papers. Colors mixed, merged, and mingled freely as participants



did the same throughout the day. Techniques and angles were tried and practiced. Soon we found we needed every inch of that drying space for our beginning efforts. Later, adding silver and gold paste gave our papers an extra luminous wow-factor. Sweeping lines, waves, landscapes, pods, french braids, alluvial fans, and "getting painterly" described the things our brushes were learning to do. Walking around the room (trying not to step on someone's drying papers) in order to look at everyone's results gave new inspiration as well as appreciation for the beauty of the technique. Our paste papers were all the same, but different.

Madeleine's technique isn't hard, but at the end of the workshop one had a new appreciation for the volume of work that Madeleine produces as well as the consistency in her work. Personally, I appreciated the consistent results that the technique fosters. It turns out that creativity with a few simple boundary rules produces lovely dependable results and some unique ideas. Our day's work produced abundant and beautiful background sheets to enhance the many hobbies represented in Kaligrafos—will it be a calligraphic broadside, a part of a book—or a card? Probably all of the above. Will it show up at the Valentine social? I hope so! How many countries will the papers we made visit? Only time will tell.



SPONTANEOUS MARK & ALTERNATIVE IMAGE: SPEAKING FROM THE HEART

When is the last time you had the opportunity to play with pens, brushes, and funky tools that made you laugh or smile—or cringe? When did you last let go of the outcome—giving yourself permission to "see what's in there"? There is no getting around it—every mark you make is creative, expressively yours. Since there's safety in numbers we'll embark on this serendipitous journey of creativity together.

In this class, you'll explore the distinctive and bold expressions of spontaneous marks using walnut and Sumi inks, combined with layering alternative image processes. We'll mix in personal ephemera through transfers without harming your originals. While we're at it we will explore and extrapolate your handwriting too.

You will be given guidance in scoring countless variations of rhythmical marks and patterns originating from intuition and response to music, sounds-or silence. This class will help you loosen any rigid body postures and sidestep predictable outcomes. Sink art techniques will also be introduced for creating blurring, dripping and running marks for breathtaking texturing effects on your papers. After some critique sessions, editing and cropping exercises, we'll move beyond the mark into image transfers. From here you'll begin to work with your own personal ephemera to create an array of words and images, that might reflect, interact with or interpolate your mark making influences—culminating in a book that provides an intuitive storytelling piece—unfolding with layered marks, handwriting, and images.
