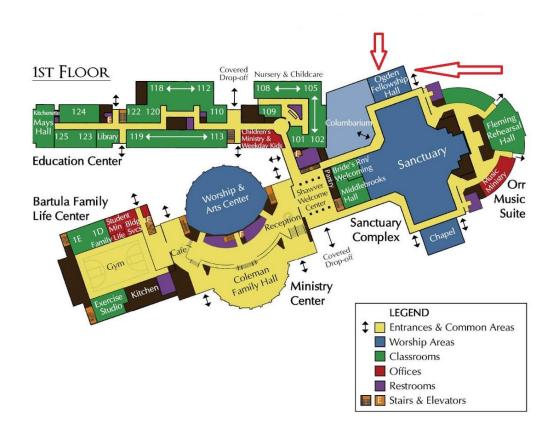

Engraving Demo

Wow! June gave an incredibly inspiring demo on engraving. One of her "secrets" was that engraving is easier for her than copperplate. That was all it took - I have already ordered my engraver and am ready to start playing.

She covered the applications that engraving could be in your personal goals. Expanding your skills and personalizing gifts can be enough for you. You can also monetize your calligraphy skills and even book live engraving events. What can be engraved? Glass, crystal, ceramics, stone, metal and even wood. Exceptions are champagne bottles (they are under pressure) and some candles (like Jo Malone). No engraving on plastic or on surfaces to be used for food.

Unlike calligraphy, engraving can be a lot more expensive. The engraver alone is over \$300. She bought hers from InkMeThis.com Their engraver has a brushless motor that is easier on the hand and lasts longer. The rechargeable battery time lasts a long time. You will also need diamond bit ball burs – these are the equivalent of your nibs. Safety goggles and a mask with carbon filters will keep the glass dust out of your eyes and lungs. You may have most of the remaining items from your calligraphy practice except the cool little mini vacuum. For those weird-shaped items, a pillow (like a buckwheat pillow) will give you a stable platform to place your item and rest your hand the pillow. You NEED to have a stable hand.

Once you have learned your new tool, the process is rather quick. Clean your item with rubbing alcohol, draft your design with a pencil or marker, engrave. It is easier to pull towards you. Keep the pressure even and not too deep. If you move too slowly, the lines may be less smooth. Continuous lines are better. Remove your dust, clean it again, and then embellish if desired. You can fill the lines with Rub & Buff and clean again. Artistro paint markers can also be used for fill especially on frosted glass or anything that will not hold onto the Rub & Buff.

June made it look easy – only a master can do that. However, she did point out that mistakes are hard to correct so draft your design and warm up your engraving hand. It is possible to print a design on sticker paper and adhere to the object. The pressure must be greater to go through the paper and object. Peel off the paper and re-engrave if needed.

Finally, June gave us some tips for when you are ready to book a live event. Be prepared for anything! Bring post it notes for the client to write the text. Carry extra supplies, a fully charged battery and ideas of the text that a client might use. Dress professionally and have fun.

To close the demonstration, June engraved several glass items that members brought. It was a fabulous demo that covered all the nuts & bolts and lots of inspiration.


UPDATE ON LAST MONTH'S ARTICLE ABOUT INSPIRE CARDS FROM JANELL WIMBERLY!

The inspire cards started as something to do to keep myself busy during the pandemic when we were all "stuck" in personal quarantine.





Ever since 2016 (with the exception of our lost year -2020), Kaligrafos has been represented at the Dallas Pen Show, and this year was no exception! The pen show is a gathering of fountain pen collectors and sellers as well as a marketplace for inks and pen paraphernalia. Kaligrafos has rented a table (or sometimes 2) to showcase our members' talents. Some members bring items to sell, with the Guild collecting the money and keeping 10% of the sales proceeds. Volunteers from our group pen names on bookmarks for visitors to the show (for free). We have a tip jar set on the table and it's usually full by the end of the day.

Other volunteers just mingle around the table, greeting visitors, promoting and talking about Kaligrafos and our mission. We have gained several new members just from the pen show contacts!

This year in addition to the free bookmarks, we offered hand painted bookmarks that we wrote names on for a \$1 donation. Jeri and Sherry provided the painted bookmarks, most with flowers on them – they were especially popular!! We have also sold our fund-raiser books (Moments in Time) to a very receptive crowd, not to mention some handmade booklets and pen boxes that were created in special play days that all members were invited to attend.

Such fun!





If you want to say hello in Te Reo (the Māori language) informally, you say "Kia ora". Please put the equivalent of "hello" on your ATC using the appropriate language.


