
Since we do not meet in December I will wish you Happy Thanksgiving, Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

According to Webster's Dictionary, the word **tool** comes from an Old English word *tawian* meaning "to prepare for use." Our four guys, Rick, Eric, Randy and Tom, equipped us to prepare our calligraphy work well.

We'll start with **Rick**. For preparing paper, he had a bone folder, a triangle, and a paper cutter which cuts AND scores. He also had these tools: an envelope maker, an envelope punch board which can punch, score and more, and even round corners. This punch board and a magnetic twist trimmer are (sometimes) available at the Tuesday Morning store. Moving on to ink tools, he recommended a "mister," that is, a spray bottle with an amazingly fine mist for water. It's available at Jerry's Artarama and the brand is Aqua Myst. For stamping tools, the website <u>www.timholtz.com</u> (Tonic Studio specifically) is a must. A favorite of Rick's is a stamping tool with magnets which can produce a special effect of shifting an image. "Stamping Up" has this, also.

Eric's specialty is Japanese writing, and he demonstrated the use of thin, crisp (and cheap) practice paper which is squared off to help with proportions. He showed us how to hold a brush like an egg, with thumb and forefinger. Strokes are slightly curved, not straight. Best ink to use is Sumi.

Randy had many tools on display: dropper bottles, a carousel brush carrier, a "tadpole" for painter's tape. Several rulers were recommended: a steel line which is good for making perpendicular lines and finding the center of a circle, a sewing ruler and a deckled edge ruler. In the board department he showed us a magnetic board, a cutting board and a light board with a USB port. For holding ink bottles, he displayed a Dinky Dip wooden holder, and for holding nibs and other small items, he had the classic plastic fishing tackle box.

Tom likes to work with a layer or two of paper under his art work rather than the hard drawing board surface. He places his exemplar on a table easel, and has two pots of water, paper towels and a specially designed ink holder which holds ink bottles at an angle (available at John Neal's). When his calligraphy is not up to standard, he troubleshoots with a "loupe" which is a jeweler's magnifying glass in order to discern the problem—is it the paper, nib or ink? For cleaning new nibs, he recommends using a cigarette lighter or a toothbrush with white (not gel) toothpaste. As a last resort, there's always your saliva. For Pilot Parallel pens, he demonstrated using a blunt-tip syringe, available at Daiso (in several Dallas area locations) to refill the cartridge or bladder. For transporting supplies he has two important tips: use Pensey spice jars for ink because the cap fits tightly, and wrap your nibs in tissue.

We were privileged to learn from these master calligraphers, and are definitely "prepared for use" in our artistic endeavors. Tim "the Toolman" Taylor on the old TV sit-com Home Improvement, has nothing on our toolmen.

UNCIAL & CELTIC KNOTS REVIEW

Twenty members of Kaligrafos and Fort Worth Calligraphers Guild gathered over the weekend of October 22nd & 23rd to learn the Uncial letterform and some Celtic knotwork from Portland based calligrapher, Holly Monroe. Holly is a 3rd generation calligrapher, her dad having attended the Zanerian School. The workshop was sponsored in partnership by both guilds.

Holly presented us with an extensive set of color handouts beginning with some historical examples of this hand, many from the Book of Kells.

Before we began delving into the letterforms, Holly talked about the different size nibs and how to measure the height of the letters for each nib. Mitchell was her preferred broad edge nib for this class. She shared how to clean the nib and prepare it for use. Since many of the students had new nibs, they had to be prepared to accept the ink. Walnut ink was used by most participants. The pen angle for this lettering style falls around 30 degrees. After practicing the alphabet, she introduced several letter variations we could incorporate in our work. Throughout these two days, Holly shared slides of her work where she used this lettering style combined with other lettering styles. What wonderful examples and inspiration she provided! Instruction was given on how to mix your gouache to a consistency for writing. Uncial is a very round alphabet with only one case (basically upper) and is a very versatile hand that plays well with others and is quite striking and legible, also often used in certificates and for titles.

Holly also introduced several types of Celtic Knots. Working with graph paper, she showed us how to form some different knot styles such as the Linked Hearts, Triquetra Heart, Josephine Knot, Diamond, and Circular. She also provided some layout ideas for us to use for our final project. The guilds provided each participant with a 6"x8" piece of handmade paper and matching envelope with deckled edges. I'm not sure how many completed their project but we all have a good start and the tools from which to do so.

Holly and her new cowboy boots weathered the storm on Monday and returned to her home in Oregon. I know that all of us had a great time in her workshop and have all sorts of ideas for future projects in our heads. So, I'm thinking......Christmas cards and Valentines!

A big thanks goes out to Angie Vangalis and Texas Lettering Arts Council for setting up a small store offering multiple calligraphy and art supplies for the participants. And, she drew names and gave away several awesome door prizes.



Each month I receive a box of ink samples from Inkjournal.com. There are seven samples in each package. The monthly box is called an "Ink Flight" and is one of the highlights of my month!

Just for fun, I've attached a picture of my testing of the October sample pack. As you might be able to tell, I test each color using my Speedball C5 nib for writing practice. I also use a medium automatic pen to test shading and layering of the ink. I drop some ink into a pool of water to test the chromatography of the ink – testing the separation of colors. As you can see from the photo, some inks separate and move more than others, sometimes giving wonderfully surprising color combinations! Some inks have sheening qualities and some have mica additions which add some shimmer and sparkle.

This month featured inks from Krishna Ink, a small ink manufacturing company based in Kerala, India. It's one of my favorite brands of ink, usually having some good shading and chromatography. I use these inks in my fountain pens and dip pens as well as dropping some into a small spray bottle half filled with water to make my own spray color for backgrounds.

I took a deep breath, then asked..."What did you call it?"


"It's a frickin' elephant! It says so on the picture!"



Graphite Techniques: Taking the Humble Pencil to New Heights A Two-Part Kaligrafos Workshop with Monica Winters

Graphite is becoming more and more a viable artistic tool in calligraphy as seasoned instructors teach pencil lettering not only as a lead-in to inked or brush lettering, but as a stand-alone artistic medium. This workshop will put its participants on the path to developing the skills and a discerning eye in creating letter forms and compositions. Even better, graphite has a bonus: you can erase!

The first session in March will begin with shading exercises and then move into drawing letter forms, both structured and invented. We will transition into applying the principles of design to create a finished project. The second session in April will explore a variety of graphite tools to create dramatic effects to focus on compositional presentation for another project.
