June will be showing us what she can about Monarch butterflies in the program this month. Be sure to catch it!



the gentle moving MONARCH BUTTERFLY

SuPPLy List

Please bring:

Scissors: You can't do the project without them. Manicure scissors work great on small butterfly.

Colorful Brush Markers: My favorite media, especially orange.

OR Watercolors Paints (including Finetec for sparkle but please use water brush)

OR Watercolor Pencils OR Colored Pencils including metallics

Add sparkle using Wink of Stella

(in short, have fun with color even though the Monarch is orange, I made a few in other colors for fun)

White Uniball Signo Pen or similar white for wing spot highlights

Fine black permanent marker for touch ups (Micron or Pitt OR...)

Sheet of white paper so you can see the colors through the Vellum

2 or 3 paper towels for placing under the wings as you add the 3D body paint

OPTIONAL: Black Scribbles 3D fabric paint or other colors

(Guild is furnishing 2 bottles to use and share if you don't have this fabric paint)

Shoe box lid or similar (if you make more than one you will need to carry out wet..)

These things will be provided to you:

Butterfly patterns already printed on Neenah Creative Collection Vellum (purchased at Office Depot)

Black 28-guage wire for antenna cut approximately 2 to 2 1/2" long

Scribbles 3-D black fabric paint for the body. These may not dry within the hour.

3/16" Glue Dots (easily replaced as they wear out from play)

Directions

PLEASE READ BEFORE YOU BEGIN. ORDER MATTERS.

USE THE SIDES & CORNERS OF THE VELLUM TO TEST YOUR COLORS FIRST.

<u>Color the wings before you cut them out!</u> Color wings top and underside if you like. **Don't forgat** to color white dots on the wings. Have fun with your colors, add sparkle.

Now CUT out your butterfly forfeiting the antenna which you will add back in a minute. Gently fold the wings up to create the valley around the wings.


Fold the wire in half and lie down in place. Squeeze narrow line of paint over the wire and fill only the provided body area. Set aside to dry. Do another one?

When dry place the permanent adhesive glue dot under the body. Turn the wings left or right a little bit and watch the butterfly rotate itself back into position.

I hope you brought a shoe box lid or similar as suggested. The thick 3-D body won't have time to dry and they will probably take flight in the windy weather.

Find a suitable resting place for your Monarch on surfaces that are almost anything but paper so that you create a removable bond and can pick up, play or reposition your Monarch butterfly.

Neuland Presented by Betty Barna Reviewed by Marilyn Arnaud

Betty demonstrated Neuland or New Land, a classic calligraphic style designed by Rudolf Koch in 1923.

We were shown several examples of ways to use this hand.

Cutting out the alphabet to use with decorative paper in the background or stacking the alphabet for an interesting art application.

Using the 6mm Pilot Parallel Pen, Betty started with the basic 0 to 90 degree angle pen strokes, as we followed along with our handouts.

While I was working in purple, glancing at others, it was interesting to see just how color can make a difference. Using walnut ink as a base then dropping in other colorful inks makes for an awesome result.

At the end of the demonstration, we were invited to use this hand to address and mail an envelope to fellow participants. I can hardly wait for our next meeting to see the different ways we all used Neuland.








































GRAPHITE TECHNIQUES FOR CALLIGRAPHERS, Part I

Presented by Monica Winters

Veteran art teacher, Monica, taught from her love for and expertise in using pencil for creating beautiful letters, Celtic knots, and more. She provided a comprehensive 15-page handout as well as instructions and a carefully prepared slide show. Special thanks to her husband, Rick Winters, and member, Sarah Schulz, for their tremendous aid in rescuing the recalcitrant computer so we could enjoy the slide show.

The pencil is mainly a monoline tool, but variation in thickness is achieved by applying pressure or drawing the letters. It is a slower process than using ink pens or brushes, but one big advantage is that you can erase easily when needed. Your observational and critical-eye skills are sharpened which will improve your calligraphy overall.

We practiced shading circles, squares and Celtic knots, doing pressure and release exercises with straight, slanted and curved lines, and the Roman alphabet. The handout contains a whimsical style of Roman letters which Monica copied from Pinterest, using varying sizes. More exercises are included to both build your skill and stimulate creativity—drawing and shading letters, writing words, and doing thumbnail sketches.

Some practical advice:

Erasers---Use part of a kneaded eraser with a flattened side to lighten some shading by merely lifting the eraser rather than rubbing. Use a Tombow Mono Zero Eraser Pen for erasing stray lines.

Paper---Use a few sheets of paper on top of your drawing board to soften the hard surface. Avoid paper that is either too slick or too textured; paper such as Strathmore 400 is recommended.

Pencils—Regular drawing pencils ranging from 2H to 6B are good, but using mechanical pencils has the advantage of not having to sharpen while working. Fixative---Use it, especially with an envelope. Hairspray works, but only the aerosol type of can.

And so, we scribes have yet another door opened to us for creating beauty and meaning with these graphite techniques. Thank you, Monica, for your wonderful instruction.




































Article for Newsletter

From them I have learned so much and they are dear to me.

Graphite is becoming more and more a viable artistic tool in calligraphy as seasoned instructors teach pencil lettering not only as a lead-in to inked or brush lettering, but as a stand-alone artistic medium. This workshop will put its participants on the path to developing the skills and a discerning eye in creating letter forms and compositions. Even better, graphite has a bonus: you can erase!

The first session in March will begin with shading exercises and then move into drawing letter forms, both structured and invented. We will transition into applying the principles of design to create a finished project. The second session in April will explore a variety of graphite tools to create dramatic effects to focus on compositional presentation for another project.
