

NOTES FROM THE CHAT IN THE "PRETTY PAISLY WORKSHOP"

In the workshop, someone asked if there were any books on the topic of paisley. Here is a suggestion of a very old book that can be viewed or downloaded at Internet Archive.org. URL at end of paragraph. "L'Ornato: vademecum per architetti, calligraphi, ceramisti,...pittori, scultori, etc..." (Published in 1921) It is written in Italian, but the drawings are decipherable. It is a 335 page download, in black and white, or one can save the image of the selected page and download and print. Starting at page 138 there are examples of filigree (paisley), similar to the triangular device that Cecilia showed. It is a compendium of various decoration styles of the past glory days. https://archive.org/details/lornatovademecum00garnuoft/mode/2up

80 lb plain color card stock 8.5"X11" (one sheet should be fine but I warn you - this is addictive so you may want several sheets)

Piece of Arches Text Wove or MBM (approx 8.5X11")

Black Strathmore Artagain or Canson Mi-Teintes (approx 8.5 X 11")

Pencil & note taking paper for recording idea

Calligraphic supplies....I will be using a pointed pen for most of my lettering but the choice is yours to make

Ink: white (pen-white) & something dark - your choice

Glue (I like PVA)

Scissors

X-acto knife

Bone folder

Black fine liner

White Signo pen (or something similar)

Needle (to poke a hole)

Optional:

Circle cutter (I recommend Fiskars Circle Cutter 193800-1001)

Drawing compass

Fons & porter chalk pencil

Feathers

1/4 inch hole punch

22 gauge wire + wire cutter (for springs)

white or cream pearl pen (Nuvo or Viva are two brands I use)

black pearl pen (Nuvo or Viva are two brands I use)

black Sakura Glaze Pen (this would be in place of the black pearl pen) small pieces of handmade paper no smaller than the diameter of your circle.... scraps of lettering you are willing to cut up (photocopy it if your not willing to cut them up)

gold cardstock




Please do not feel you need to run out and purchase the optional items. I will be demonstrating and using these items and it will give you an opportunity to see if you want to purchase them later.

Neuland Cut-Outs with Betty Barna

September Program review by Sarah Schulz








Examples of how one cut-out can produce two finished pieces using both the "positive" and the "negative"

Betty Barna gave us a wonderful program explaining the technique for cut out letters which she learned from Carl Rohrs. Betty says this is a technique that she frequently uses for cards. Participants brought a cutting mat, x-acto knife, glue, white gel pen for highlights, removable tape (I brought washi), and colored paper to put behind their cut-outs. Betty supplied a print-out of a letter in Neuland 240 point font, black cover-weight paper, and bandaids! Fortunately, those weren't needed.

First, we placed our printed letter over the black cover-weight paper and taped it down to our cutting mat. Cut through both layers, then you have a positive and a negative - two items can be made from one cutting. When cutting, Betty advises putting your blade down, start at the corner then push forward slightly because the corners are tricky to remove. Pushing forward slightly helps ensure that the cut-out will pop out when done. Betty advises starting with the straight side first!








Tips: hold the paper down while cutting to avoid paper buckling. Start with the counters first, as they're difficult to do later. What is a counter? (Glad you asked, I didn't know either!) The counter is the inside of a letter, like the triangle in A, or the inner oval in O, or the two stacked counters in B. And definitely do NOT lose your counter pieces! To manipulate them, tweezers are handy. Always cut toward yourself and keep your fingers out of the way so you don't get cut! For round letters, work around slowly, bit by bit. "Don't worry, it's still gonna look cool no matter what you do." While cutting, move

your elbow and not your fingers!

When you're done cutting, you can throw away the white paper with the printed out letter. (Other options for the base design to cut are to use a marker to generate calligraphy with weight to it - delicate styles will be difficult to cut out.) Both the negative and positive pieces can be used. Janell Wimberly gave a tip to have some fun with the counters if you like - you can purposely have them be



offset for a more playful look. But to get the counters perfectly situated, put the positive back into the negative, then place and glue the counter and remove the main letter.

Once you're done with gluing, now it's time for some fun with your gel pen to outline and add highlights. Some options were 2+ lines, dots, wavy outlines - time for casual creativity, no need to measure.





For pretty colored paper, there are lots of options. Just a few include paste paper, wrapping paper, calendar scenes, travel brochures, etc. Any pretty paper will work! A word of caution for sticking your letters on: they can pop off if you're not careful, and take extra care when putting these on an envelope. Betty said she's only heard of a letter coming off once, and after it was in the recipient's hands, but she had some good advice for adhesives. She recommends a japanese glue stick, Coccoina glue sticks (available on Amazon) which have an almond smell, are juicier, and stick better and faster. She advises against UHU sticks as they tend to dry out. Furthermore, she recommends putting a weight on it, such as heavy books - if you're also a bookbinder you should be fairly familiar with this tip!

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT SARAH SCHULZ

Greetings! I'm Sarah Schulz (no T!), and I joined Kaligrafos in October 2022. I've been doing Calligraphy off and on since fifth grade in the '90s, and far more since joining Kaligrafos! I grew up in Salt Lake City, Utah, surrounded by mountains and a desert climate. We moved to Allen, Texas in August 2019 when my husband's job relocated to the Dallas area. My husband Gregory and I have 3 kids, ages 13, 11, and 7. When I'm not doing



calligraphy, I'm a full-time parent, a soprano with Millennial Choirs and Orchestras, making soap, learning French, sewing, volunteering with school/church/community, or going for a run. I'm left-handed, and I've appreciated how wonderful everyone has been at pointing out all the other lefty members! I may not be a seasoned professional but I'm happy to categorize myself as an "enthusiastic newbie" to Kaligrafos.

How did I get started in calligraphy?

In fifth grade, my dad bought me one of those Sheaffer calligraphy kits, as well as a Speedball textbook, and later on an Elegant Writer marker set with instruction book. Chances are high that they all came from Michael's. I remember working through the whole Speedball textbook thinking I had to do it right-handed so I tried learning it all with my right hand - it was both a struggle and a mess. When I worked my way to the back of the book I finally found the page on left-handed calligraphers and I started having a lot more fun! I've been doing calligraphy on and off ever since, usually because my mom would request a scripture to be written in calligraphy or just for fun. Until I joined Kaligrafos, everything I learned was from a book or, later on, from blog posts (and more books). Several years ago I also picked up brush lettering, which is quick and easy with kids around.

How did I hear about Kaligrafos?

I heard about Kaligrafos last year at the Dallas Pen Show. I must admit that since my first calligraphy experiences were with fountain pens, I got interested in them

again after moving to Texas, and fell down the fountain pen rabbit hole. I was looking up the list of vendors for the pen show and saw "Calligraphy Guild" and was instantly sold by both words. I love calligraphy, and how cool does a guild sound?! (100% cool is the answer.) I stopped by the table and got my name done by Tom Burns and chatted with basically everyone there. I came to the next meeting and joined on the spot.

What keeps me coming back to the meetings?

Two things: the people and learning new things! Everyone has been so wonderful and helpful, answering my questions and occasionally listening to me ramble, and chatting about tools and inks. It's been inspiring to see so many calligraphers with years and years of professional experience and to be able to see their work and learn from them. I've learned a lot in the last year, and my calligraphy has become quite a bit more disciplined. I finally branched out and got pointed pen nibs, and a holder. I've enjoyed the programs and workshops; I'm always excited to learn something new.

What is my favorite hand?

Honestly, it goes back and forth. My current favorite is probably Copperplate since my goal this summer was to learn it and I've spent the last few months practicing.

What is my favorite medium?

That's not a fair question! Just kidding, I really love fountain pen inks since they come in so many stunning colors. I always find myself trying to figure out a way to use my inks for calligraphy.

What is my favorite tool?

My favorite tool will probably always be my first calligraphic love of fountain pens. I love the variety of inks, although I've been having a lot of fun learning to make my own Finetec watercolors, so that probably gets second place, tied with brush markers.


What do I do with my calligraphy?

A little of everything. Every year we send out a Christmas card and I do the addresses in some form of calligraphy. I also love to write favorite quotes or scriptures in calligraphy, and any time I give someone a card I try to write their name in calligraphy. Calligraphy practice is also a stress reliever for me; I always feel better after practicing one hand or another.


What would I tell a new calligrapher?

Use guidelines! I know they're a pain to create, but I never really started using guidelines until I joined Kaligrafos and they've made my calligraphy SO much better. Beyond that, my advice is that you don't need to spend a ton to write beautifully, you can even do calligraphy with a pencil!

CAPTIVATING COLOR: CHOOSING, MIXING, AND USING WATERCOLOR FOR CALLIGRAPHY


